

Three worthwhile movies come out in different genres

For this issue, I bring to you three new movies from three different genres. The first film, *Pathfinder*, is an action/adventure movie that looks as if it is of high quality, but nothing like *Lord of the Rings* or *300*. The second film, *Disturbia*, is a horror/mystery movie that doesn't seem as gory or frustratingly stupid as most horror movies are. The third and last film, *Aqua Teen Hunger Force Colon Movie Film for Theaters*, is an animated comedy from the cartoon show we all know of and looks to be funny (Good thing I'm here to explain the obvious)

PATHFINDER: LEGEND OF THE GHOST WARRIOR

First up is *Pathfinder: Legend of the Ghost Warrior*, a story set in the North Eastern U.S. back in 900 B.C. It is about a young Viking boy who was left behind on a raid while his clan fought with the local Indians. The Indians, upon discovering the boy, take him in as their own, despite the fact that some of the Indians consider him to be "bad" magic. He grows up to be a skilled warrior and tracker, and takes up the name Ghost (Karl Urban) because of his pale skin (compared to the Native Americans).

One day, his clan returns on another raid and threatens to destroy his adopted tribe. Ghost valiantly fights off his biological family to save his new family. Other characters include Pathfinder (Russel Means), the shaman of Ghosts' tribe; Star Fire (Moon Bloodgood), Ghosts' lover; Blackwing (Jay Tavare), an Indian warrior from Ghosts' tribe; Gunnar (Clancy Brown), a cruel and vicious Viking warrior; and Ulfar (Ralf

Moeller) another Viking raider. This film is not yet rated.

DISTURBIA

Next, is *Disturbia*, which is about a teenage boy named Kale (Shia LaBeouf) who is under house arrest for punching an insensitive teacher who uttered a careless comment about the boys' less than honorable father. Kale has to stay at home by

himself for two months, as his mother (Carrie-Anne Moss) has to work double time in order to keep up.

To stay sane, Kale sets up secret cameras all over the outside of his house and spies on his neighbors. One of his neighbors, Ashley (Sarah Roemer), a hot teenage girl, finds out about his little hobby, and instead of being angry, she is interested and joins in. Together, they begin to suspect that one of their shared neighbors is a murderer, and they have evidence on film. However, the neighbor finds out about their spying and they soon find their lives in danger. This film is rated PG-13.

AQUA TEEN HUNGER FORCE COLON MOVIE FILM FOR THEATERS

Last, but not least (boy am I clever), is *Aqua Teen Hunger Force Colon Movie Film for Theaters*. For those of you who have seen the trailer, you know as much about the movie as I do: nothing. The trailer starts off as most epic and dramatic movie trailers start off, with a deep and mysterious voice giving out vague predictions of the story, but in a subtly mocking way, such as, "An ancient wizard, a child with a secret, a woman with a past, ...and a flaming chicken," all the while with a distant storm thundering and creepy blade rasping noises coming from the background. This goes on for quite a while, until at the very end, the

The actual story is about the main three characters (Frylock, Meatwad and Master Shake) saving the world from an apocalyptic exercise machine called the "Insanoflex," which was probably created by the mad scientist seen at the beginning of every episode of the cartoon. The film comes from Fist Look International studios and was directed by Matt Maiellaro and Dave Willis. The voices of the main characters are the same as the cartoon, with Dana Snyder as Master Shake, Dave Willis as Meatwad and Carl, and Carey Means as Frylock. This film is rated R (so bring parents!).
